David Church BVSc, PhD, MACVSc, MRCVS

David obtained his veterinary degree from The University of Sydney and after graduation and a short spell in practice he was appointed as a small animal clinical instructor there before enrolling in a PhD programme in the Faculty of Medicine looking at various aspects of the pathophysiology of diabetes mellitus. He is now the Vice-Principal (Learning and Student Experience) at the Royal Veterinary College. He is an internationally recognised specialist in disorders of the endocrine system in dogs and cats. David's current research interests are varied but include the underlying mechanism for the development and resolution of diabetes mellitus.

Jill Maddison BVSc, Dip Vet Clin Stud, PhD, FACVSc, MRCVS, SFHEA

Another graduate of the University of Sydney, Jill worked and studied in Australia and Canada before moving to the UK. She is now Professor of General Practice and responsible for the RVC's Continuing Professional Development (CPD) programme including management of the RCVS Certificate of Advanced Veterinary Practice. She is also Director of Clinical Extramural Studies (EMS) and contributes to the RVC's teaching programme for veterinary students and veterinary nurses in the areas of small animal medicine, clinical reasoning and clinical pharmacology.

Paul Mahoney BVSc (Syd), DVR, DECVDI, Cert VC, FHEA, MRCVS

Paul Mahoney graduated from the University of Sydney, and after several years in mixed and small animal practice in both Australia and the UK, he completed his radiology training at the Royal Veterinary College in London. He has spent over 20 years working as a radiologist both in university and in small animal referral practice. He has examined at RCVS Certificate level, Australian Fellowship level and European Diploma level (currently Chief Examiner for the DipECVDI) and is now enjoying farm life in the Warwickshire countryside while working for IDEXX Telemedicine Consultants.

Marie Jones BSc (Hons), Dip AVN (Med), Cert Ed, RVN

Marie trained in Small Animal general practice. Once qualified she spent a number of years in general practice before moving to the Royal Veterinary College, Queen Mother Hospital, a small animal referral centre. Whilst working there Marie developed an interest in medical nursing and gained the diploma in advanced veterinary nursing (medical). She currently works as a lecturer and internal verifier for the College of Animal Welfare.

Rachel Lumbis MSc, BSc (Hons), Cert SAN, RVN, FHEA

Rachel qualified as a Veterinary Nurse in 2002 whilst working in a small animal practice. She then moved to London and completed a BSc honours degree in Veterinary Nursing. During this period, she developed an interest in internal medicine and nutrition, completing a certificate in small animal nutrition. Rachel joined the Royal Veterinary College in 2008 where she works as a Lecturer in Veterinary Nursing teaching across a range of undergraduate and postgraduate courses. She is an examiner for the RCVS and the City & Guilds practical exams, a member of the editorial board for The Veterinary Nurse and a past council member of the BVNA.
