

Our Conference speakers



Ross Bond

Ross graduated from Glasgow Veterinary School in 1985, spent five years in farm and small animal practice, and then joined the Royal Veterinary College in 1990, where he is currently Professor in Veterinary Dermatology and Head of the Dermatology Service. His research work into yeast infections in dogs led to an award of a PhD in 1996. Ross holds RCVS and European College Diplomas in Veterinary Dermatology and is recognised as a specialist in veterinary dermatology by the RCVS. His research interests relate primarily to microbial skin infections in dogs and cats.



Sarah Caney

Sarah is a graduate of the University of Bristol where she also did her residency in feline medicine and PhD. She is an RCVS Specialist in Feline Medicine and enjoys seeing a mixture of first opinion and referral feline patients. She has written a number of books for cat owners and veterinary professionals including 'Caring for a cat with chronic kidney disease', 'Caring for a cat with hyperthyroidism' and 'Caring for an elderly cat' published by her company Cat Professional, a subdivision of Vet Professionals Ltd (www.vetprofessionals.com). Sarah does a lot of owner-orientated feline research through online questionnaires and is especially interested in geriatric feline medicine.



Claire Defries

Claire qualified as a veterinary nurse in 2001 and went on to work as a senior nurse at The Queen Mother Hospital for Animals. She gained the Diploma in Advanced Veterinary Nursing (medical), working mainly in anaesthesia and diagnostic imaging, and was responsible for the endoscopy unit in the hospital. Claire developed an interest in laparoscopic surgery and flexible endoscopy. She moved into full time lecturing at a college in Staffordshire and joined The College of Animal Welfare in 2013 where she is now centre manager. Claire has achieved a Post Grad Dip in Veterinary Education at the RVC and is now working towards her MSc research project.



Marie Holowaychuk

Marie is a specialist in small animal emergency and critical care. She travels worldwide as a speaker, consultant, researcher, editor and locum. She received her DVM degree in 2004 and following an internship in small animal medicine and surgery, she completed a 3-year small animal emergency and critical care residency at North Carolina State University. Marie was Asst. Professor of Emergency and Critical Care Medicine at the University of Guelph until 2013. She has been primary or coauthor of more than 30 published manuscripts in peer-reviewed journals & is an Assistant Editor for the Journal of Veterinary Emergency and Critical Care. She has spoken at many events including the International Veterinary Emergency and Critical Care Society and various general practitioner conferences.
