The most current practice to detect, assess, and manage orthopaedic joint diseases in growing dogs will be presented and discussed. Early diagnosis is crucial, because of the risk of irreversible changes in the affected joint with delayed diagnosis. Clinical signs can be subtle, and are not always obvious to the owner, therefore the veterinarian has an important role in screening adolescent dogs, especially hips, knees and elbows, for orthopaedic diseases.



Heidi is a Senior Lecturer in Small Animal Surgery at the University of Cambridge, which she joined in 2006 after having studied and worked at the universities of Munich, Zurich, Georgia, Texas and Bern. She runs, as European and Royal College specialist, a busy referral and teaching clinic in small animal orthopaedics at the University's Queen's Veterinary School Hospital. Heidi's clinical responsibilities include all aspects of orthopaedics in dogs and cats, with a particular interest in joint surgery including minimal invasive techniques like arthroscopy, and she gets excited about the management of complicated trauma and angular limb deformity cases.
