

Society and has received awards for services to the UK sheep industry and to sheep health & welfare.

Laura Cuddy



Laura graduated from University
College Dublin (UCD) in 2008 with a first
class honours degree in Veterinary
Medicine. She completed a rotating
internship in small animal medicine and
surgery, followed by a Masters of
Science and residency in small animal
surgery at the University of Florida (UF).
In 2013, Laura joined UCD as Assistant
Professor in Small Animal Surgery. She
was welcomed as a Diplomate of the

American and European Colleges of Veterinary Surgeons in 2014, and as a Diplomate of the American and European Colleges of Veterinary Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation in 2015 and 2018, respectively. She is actively involved in teaching and regularly delivers lectures and practical workshops nationally and internationally. Her research interests include orthopaedic biomechanics, especially medial coronoid disease in dogs, as well as teaching and proficiency assessment in minimally-invasive procedures. Laura maintains a strong interest in all aspects of orthopaedic, soft tissue, neurologic and oncologic surgery, however, her main clinical interests reflect her advanced training at UF in minimally-invasive techniques, traumatology and rehabilitation of the postoperative patient. She currently delivers her clinical services in all aspects of s/a surgery, sports medicine and rehabilitation from her newly opened referral hospital in Summerhill, Co Meath.

Eddie Clutton



Eddie graduated (BVSC [hons]) from the University of Liverpool 1981. He worked for three years in the Department of Anaesthesia, The Royal Liverpool Hospital before undertaking Did various locums in mixed practice in Cheshire and South Wales. He was awarded Cert VA (RCVS) in 1983 and the DVA in 1988. Eddie then worked in the University of Virginia – Maryland, USA for 5 years as assistant professor in Veterinary Anesthesiology. He has been Head of anaesthesia in R(D)SVS (Edinburgh) since

1990 and became Diplomate of the European College of Veterinary Anaesthesia in 1996. He is a Member of the Royal College of Anaesthetists, the European Society of Anaesthesiology, the Animal Welfare Science, Ethics and Law Veterinary Association, LAVA, LASA, and the Veterinary History Society. Eddie was Editor-in-chief of Veterinary Anaesthesia and Analgesia (2000 – 2005) and is a past President of the Association of Veterinary Anaesthetists. His research interests include mini pig welfare, muscle relaxants in pigs and sheep, pain in pigs and sheep; depth of anaesthesia monitoring. Eddie Anaesthetized world's first mammalian clone (twice). He was awarded Chair of Veterinary Anaesthesiology August 2007 and the Morpheus Award 2019 (ECVAA). Currently, Eddie is Clinical Director of the Wellcome Trust Critical Care Laboratory for Large Animals and Academic Head, Veterinary Anaesthesia (R[D]SVS). He was approved FRCVS June 2019.

Peter Edmondson



Peter is a vet who spent 35 years in dairy practice before forming UdderWise, a veterinary consultancy. He works with farmers, vets, pharmaceutical and dairy processing businesses around the world. He qualified from Trinity College Dublin in 1980. After five years in vet practice in Ireland he joined Almarai working with large dairy herds in Saudi Arabia and China. He then moved to a specialist dairy practice in the south-west of England. Peter's postgraduate qualifications include FRCVS; RCVS Registered Specialist in Cattle Health

and Production; Diplomat of the European College of Bovine Health Management (DipECBHM) and RCVS Certificate in Cattle Health and Production (CertCHP) however he is adamant that he is not an academic or a researcher. He is a trainer who has lectured across the globe and is known for his practical approaches to problem solving. He has written three books; 'How to Control Somatic Cell Counts', 'How to Control Clinical Mastitis' and 'Mastitis Control in Dairy Herds'. Peter is passionate about transferring skills to small scale dairy farmers in Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe and visits Africa two or three times each year to carry out voluntary work. John Fishwick



Senior Lecturer, Royal Veterinary College and past President of BVA, John graduated as a vet from Cambridge in 1985 having gained an intercalated degree in Pharmacology. He worked for 5 years in mixed practice in Cheshire and Essex, gaining the RCVS Certificate in Cattle Health & Production in 1988 before moving to the RVC in 1990 where

he ran the RVC's farm animal practice. In 1997 he moved to Saudi Arabia where he worked as Head Vet to the world's largest fully integrated dairy company, farming over 25,000 high producing dairy cows in a desert environment. He returned to the RVC in 2003 as Senior Lecturer in Dairy Herd Medicine and was head of the newly formed Department of Production & Population Health from 2012 to 2017. He is an RCVS and European College Specialist. He was president of the BVA 2017-18.

Jude McCann



Jude joined Rural Support in 2012 as the Chief Executive. He grew up on a farm in Mid-Ulster and lived in New Zealand for 7years. He graduated from Queen's University in 2007 after completing a PhD examining Rural Restructuring and Information Systems in New Zealand and Northern Ireland. He also recently

completed a Nuffield Scholarship where he embarked on a journey to thirteen different countries including Switzerland, New Zealand, Norway & America, and conducted over 80 face to face interviews so that he could gain a global perspective on current and emerging issues and challenges facing farmers and farm families. Colin has also completed an Advanced Diploma in Management Practice from the University of Ulster and is a former Vice President of the Young Farmers' Clubs of Ulster.

Sam Strain



Sam Strain is Chief Executive of Animal Health and Welfare Northern Ireland (AHWNI). AHWNI is the delivery organisation for the NI BVD Eradication Programme. He has worked in mixed general practice and undertaken research into mycobacterial infections including the early pathogenesis of TB and Johne's Disease, the evaluation of novel vaccine and diagnostic targets for bovine mycobacterial diseases and the effect of parasite co-infection on

mycobacterial immune responses and disease outcomes. He is currently a member of the Animal Health Ireland (AHI) Technical Working Group providing technical input into the AHI Johne's Control Programme and the scientific member of the TB Eradication Partnership group tasked with overseeing the Northern Ireland bovine TB eradication programme.
